

## PRAYER LETTER OF CHALLENGE LITERATURE FELLOWSHIP (AUST.) INC.

A number of years ago I was walking by a park at night. It was pitch black which meant that you could not make out even the darkest of outlines of an object in front of you. All of a sudden I heard a growl coming at pace towards me. I tried desperately to see what it was that was coming at me but couldn't. In a situation like that you are trying to see what you can do to limit the damage and you are fighting to keep your emotions under control. I was wearing a heavy overcoat because it was winter and because I could not see what was coming at me, I braced myself for the worst. My feet seemed like they were glued to the footpath and I struggled to hold back crying out into the darkness.

Then out of the pitch blackness came two Doberman dogs running along together with their tongues hanging out having a great time together, absolutely oblivious to the fact that they had taken several years off my life. Fear is one of those emotions that can completely immobilize us in our spiritual journey, often because we are worrying about our future. Going through valley experiences are not pleasant but they are nonetheless an essential part of our spiritual growth and development. Often our response to difficult times is to pray that God will remove the problem, or take us out of the situation that is causing the problem.

However, if you look through the bible you will notice that rarely does God remove people out of difficult times. A classic example of this is Daniel. He had been sentenced to the lion's den and was looking right down the proverbial gun barrel. I have often wondered what he was praying when they were leading him to the den. I am sure that the soldiers were thinking that this was not going to take too long for Daniel to become a tasty meal for starving lions. God, however, had other ideas because it was going to be one of the means of getting the gospel to the rest of the world.

We need to see what David brings to our attention in Psalm 23:4 when he states that; "I will fear no evil; for you are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me. No matter what we are going through we need to realize that we have God with us. Remember Daniel's friends, Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego and how they were cast into a furnace heated seven times hotter than normal. Have you ever wondered why that was allowed by God? I think that the main reason was that there would be no doubt who was responsible for the deliverance of the tree young men. When Nebuchadnezzar looked into the furnace he saw someone who looked like the Son of Man. There was Jesus in the midst of the furnace right alongside three young men who must have been wondering what their future was. God wonderfully delivered them through the furnace and they came out of their trial without even the slightest smell of burnt flesh.

It is also very encouraging to know that God is not only there for us, particularly in testing times, but that His rod and staff are being used to comfort us. A shepherd used a rod to protect his sheep from the enemy such as wolves, lions and bears. A shepherd used his staff for a number of reasons. One important purpose was to discipline wayward sheep. It is important for us to understand that whatever trials come our way they have first come via the Lord. Whatever the circumstances God is fully aware of them and indeed has allowed them to come our way so that His divine purposes can be achieved in our lives.

In fact once we see what God is trying to do, in all its importance, it brings real comfort to our hearts and puts us in a place where we can learn from our trials rather then complain about them. This is also another reason why we don't have to fear evil because God has filtered it through His sovereign providential working. I don't think that I know anything more encouraging than that. We have a wonderful divine shepherd who cares for us in providing for our every need spiritually, emotionally and physically.
